*From the
Executive Secretary*

In the United States and in many other countries, January 1st is recognized as the beginning of the New Year. Yet in the world's most populated country, China, February 7 is the first day of the New Year.

It may surprise some to learn that unlike the Chinese calendar, which has been in continuous use for more than 4,000 years, our current Western calendar dates back only several hundred years. Another interesting fact about the Chinese lunar calendar is that every month and year is named after an animal of the Chinese zodiac. It happens that 2008 is the Year of the Rat.

At this point, you may be asking what does the Year of the Rat have to do with the Educational Approval Board (EAB)? In the West, the Rat is reviled as little more than a bottom-dwelling disease carrier. The Rat is viewed much differently in the East where it symbolizes a seed of foundation.

As the EAB begins the New Year, many of the seeds to establish the foundation for its new regulatory model will be put in place.

During the approved-schools conference last November, the EAB shared information about its redesigned school visit process, the

way EAB staff will verify employment data collected by the schools, and how all schools will be required to have an institutional plan.

In the spirit of the conference theme, which was "Moving Forward," allow me to briefly highlight how the EAB will be moving forward in 2008 to build the foundation of its new regulatory model.

- School Visits

Starting in January, the EAB began to use its redesigned school visit process and conducted school visits with four on-line only institutions. It has also contacted those institutions that are scheduled to be visited in February.

While a school visit must ensure all approved schools comply with Wisconsin's consumer protection requirements, the EAB firmly believes it is also an opportunity to strengthen the school's capacity to improve its internal processes, data collection and evaluation, and student outcomes. Through the school visit process, the EAB is seeking

Capella Will Launch New Program for Menominee Nation

Keshena, WI--In fall 2008, the College of Menominee Nation (CMN), a tribal community college in Keshena, Wisconsin, will launch its first four-year program,

making it possible for teachers on the reservation to advance from an associate degree to a bachelor's degree in Early Childhood/Elementary Education.

Leading the development of the four-year program is Sharon Fredericks, a full-time instructor and chair of the Social Sciences Division at CMN. In fact, the program is what compelled Fredericks to pursue her PhD—something she'd been putting off for years. "I feel a tremendous responsibility to this institution because it belongs to my tribal community. When the dean of instruction approached me to serve as chair of the four-year program, I knew it was time to earn my PhD."

A colleague suggested she might find an online program that would meet her needs, and allow her to spend more time with her husband and four children while she pursued her degree. "I looked at several online universities, considering factors such as accreditation, credit transfer, and rigor of the coursework."

Her search led her to choose Capella, where she enrolled in one course "just to see how it went." She attended her first colloquium one month into her first quarter and discovered a strong support group. "There were three of us who really stuck together, meeting every morning and evening at colloquium. We committed to graduating together." All three learners are now in the dissertation phase and check in regularly to offer encouragement and track each other's progress.

Last June, Fredericks was awarded the American Indian College Fund/College of Menominee Nation Faculty Member of the Year award, and in August was awarded the prestigious Mellon Foundation Fellowship for 2007-2008. She is on track to complete her PhD program in summer 2008. She has encouraged colleagues at CMN to pursue an advanced degree, and one of her co-workers is currently enrolled in a master's program at Capella. "Achieving a PhD is primarily a matter of persistence," she advises. "If

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to work cooperatively with schools so that they are more effective at enabling students to succeed.

- Employment Verification

The EAB believes that the best way to protect consumers is to enhance the schools and their programs by holding schools accountable for outcomes data. During the next renewal cycle, which starts in July and runs through September 1, schools will be expected to provide to the EAB employment information for students that have completed their education/training program so it can be verified.

In past years, the EAB staff has worked with school officials to design and define a descriptive and meaningful set of student outcomes. “Employed” is one of the student outcome categories, and is defined as “[c]ompleters who found new employment in a training-related field, completers who advance with their current employer as a direct result of the training provided by the school, or completers whose employer required completion of the program.”

Because the number of completers who are employed is central to evaluating the success of schools and their graduates, it is critical that the employment information is accurate and reliable so that future students can make informed choices about which schools to attend.

The EAB shared at its conference the process it will use to contact employers and verify the “employment” data reported by schools.

- Institutional Planning


During one of the sessions at the EAB’s conference Chris Lambert of the Accrediting Commission of Career Schools and Colleges of Technology (ACCSCT) led a discussion on the importance of institutional planning. Because schools will

be required to submit an institutional plan by September 1, 2009, the EAB will be conducting a number of training sessions later this year to assist schools in the nuts and bolts of developing and using institutional plans. On the National Front

OEDb Releases 2008 Online College Rankings

Houston, TX--Online Education Database, an independent for-profit organization, was established September 2006 to build a comprehensive database of the top accredited online colleges and the degree programs that they offer. This is the second year that the rankings have been published.

The rankings include the most significant degree-granting undergraduate online colleges that operate nationally as determined by their selection.

For each college, the group gathered data for eight different metrics: acceptance rate, financial aid, graduation rate, peer Web citations, retention rate, scholarly citations, student-faculty ratio and years accredited. The overall ranking ranks each college by its average ranking for each metric for which data was available.

Credit Crunch Taking Hold

Inside Higher Ed (insidehighered.com) reported on January 23 that the aftermath of

the student loan scandal, signs of a coming recession, and other financial indicators have hit the for-profit sector and caused worry for other providers.

Several leading companies that provide higher education announced that they have been told by Sallie Mae and other lenders that they would severely restrict or cut back entirely on student loans to their students. Sallie Mae announced that it will no longer make private loans available for students who present higher credits risks.

On January 24, Sallie Mae announced at a press conference that it will stop offering loans to students at colleges with poor graduation rates.

Alfred L. Lord, Sallie Mae's chief executive, announced that colleges with low graduation rates are "singularly responsible" for more than 60 percent of credit losses at Sallie Mae in 2007.

Many student loan experts believe that lenders had gone too far in making costly private loans to students who should not have received them, because they did not have the financial wherewithal to manage significant levels of debt at high interest rates.

Experts believe that the next sector that could see its students face limits on what they can borrow are some small, private colleges that educate significant numbers of low-income and first-generation students. And, if the economy goes into a full recession, all colleges could see their financial situations affected if the credit markets drag down the stock market (and colleges' endowments with them) resulting in a downturn in state support.

Commenting about the credit crunch, Harris N. Miller, President of the Career College Association, stated, "Unfortunately the lending market is one big happy mess now. My sense is that the big schools will figure a way out. I'm more concerned about the middle-sized schools and smaller schools who can't self-finance these loans ..."



Board News

The Educational Approval Board met on December 13, 2007 in Madison. Board members approved the staffs' administrative actions completed since their last meeting, approved the renewal multiplier and set meeting dates for 2008 (see calendar on page 8).

In addition, board members discussed the 2008-13 Strategic Plan. They agreed to respond to questions set forth by the staff about the strategic plan and will discuss their responses at the next meeting on March 13, 2008 in Madison.

Know the Code . . .

Placement Services

EAB's modernization legislation requires approved schools to report student outcome numbers, including employment, which is often the most difficult information for schools to collect.

Chapter EAB 9 outlines the requirements for placement service activities.

At a minimum, school placement centers must meet the following requirements:

- 1) Student referrals must result from direct contact between the school placement service and prospective employer representatives.
- 2) Evidence of student referrals must be maintained and should include, but not be limited to the following:
 - a) Number of referrals by company per individual student.
 - b) The results of referrals.
 - c) Final placement.
 - d) Percent of graduates placed.

Employment Advisory Services

Many EAB-approved schools choose to provide employment advisory services. The services usually include employment counseling or services not meeting the minimum requirements of placement services. These services may include job referrals that are not the result of direct contact between the school and prospective employers.

Schools providing employment advisory services must also report student outcomes results to EAB.

Bryant & Stratton to Modernize Downtown Campus

Milwaukee, WI--A year after completing an expansion of its Wauwatosa campus, Bryant & Stratton College will take similar steps to update its downtown Milwaukee campus.

Expansion of the college's facility is underway and scheduled to be completed by March. The facility will have four new classrooms and renovations of several others. The college will add a medical lab for the medical assisting program and a mock courtroom for criminal justice and paralegal education.

With downtown enrollment jumping from 150 students to 750 between 2001 and 2003, college officials saw the need for more space downtown.

"We're not of the preference to be much bigger than 750 or 800 students on any one campus," said Peter Pavone, director of the college.

Downtown Milwaukee's programs that have grown in recent years include business degree and criminal justice programs, but the school's fastest-growing programs are in health care.

Highlights from the “Moving Forward” Conference

Madison, WI--One hundred twenty-five participants from seventy-seven schools (a 30% increase from last year) attended the annual EAB approved schools conference on November 15, 2007. This was the largest number of participants to attend the annual conference. The attendance at the annual conference has been growing every year; and from the information we received on the conference evaluations, we know that participants enjoy the day, gain new ideas and value the networking opportunities the conference provides. For the first time, the conference was video taped and a copy of the video is on our website.

The theme of the conference was “Moving Forward.” The conference speakers added to the building blocks EAB introduced at the 2006 conference that was titled “Schools That Work.”

John B. Lee, President of JBL Associates, Inc. of Bethesda, Maryland, presented the keynote address, “National Perspectives: Demographics, Accountability, and the Economic Impact of Career Schools.” Mr. Lee began his presentation by giving a brief history of postsecondary education in the U.S. He brought participants up-to-date by stating that the U.S. must increase educational achievement if we are to remain competitive in the world economy. He pointed out that this is going to be difficult because the generation entering postsecondary education age will pose greater educational challenges than we’ve seen in the past.

Mr. Lee noted that proprietary schools will continue to be a part of the educational solution because they are market responsive and do provide an effective education. He believes that as other providers will continue to be critical of proprietary schools, so the challenge for them will be to limit

aggressive marketing, document job placement and continue to increase their transparency.

Christopher Lambert, Associate Director of Commission Relations at the Accrediting Commission of Career Schools and Colleges of Technology (ACCSCT), spoke to the attendees on “Developing and Using Institutional Plans. All EAB approved schools will be required to have institutional plans under the provisions of our modernization bill.

Mr. Lambert spoke at length about the shared goals for institutional enhancement that both ACCSCT and EAB believe in. He also outlined the keys to institutional effectiveness. They include writing a mission statement, showing the commitment of institutional leaders, developing incentives, establishing a timeline for implementing the activities, planning to educate stakeholders, taking action based on results and reporting on the institution’s progress.

State Representative Stephen Nass of the 31st Assembly provided comments about AB 281/SB 174, our modernization bill. Brian Newman, Manager of the Career College Association, spoke about school involvement in the legislative process.

Patrick Sweeney, EAB School Administration Consultant, concluded the day by outlining the steps EAB will take to implement its modernization initiative. He explained that the implementation process will include employment verification, the school visit, and institutional planning. Implementing EAB’s modernization initiative will include working with the whole school system, providing a context for schools to improve over time, holding schools accountable for results, and providing good information to the public.

ONLINE EDUCATION CONTINUES SUBSTANTIAL GROWTH: The 2007 Sloan Survey of Online Learning, released by the Babson Survey Research Group, reveals that nearly one in five higher education students now takes at least one class online. Overall, online enrollment rose by nearly ten percent in the fall of 2006, to 3.49 million students. LOOK AT WHO'S ON YOUTUBE: The Chronicle of Higher Education recently reported that college professors are the latest YouTube stars. One Web site that hopes to make it big on YouTube is Big Think, "a YouTube for ideas." Although surprised by how popular the colleges' content has been, YouTube officials are not surprised by the buzz, and say more colleges are coming forward to be on YouTube.

NEW STUDY FINDS NO INCREASE IN STUDENT NARCISSISM: In the Summer 2007 issue of the *EAB Quarterly* we reported on a study conducted on 16,475 college students nationwide who completed an evaluation called the Narcissistic Personal Inventory (NPI) between 1996 and 2006. Professor Jean Twenge and her colleagues concluded from the results of the study that the words we use to motivate our young people may lead to more narcissistic and self-centered young adults than their predecessors.

A new study challenges this study. The new study looked at the NPI scores from 26,000 students who took the same test on the Berkeley and Davis campuses of the University of California in 1996, and each year from 2002 to 2007. The authors of the new study write that scores have declined slightly since the 1980's.

- Woyci v. Midwest College of Oriental Medicine – direction given to school about resolving complaint.



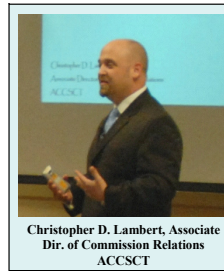
